It has come to my attention after mailing the Answer to the Complaint in case number CV 10-8142-PCT-JWS that a Minute Entry had been made in this case. I asked a friend who has access to Pacer to please obtain a copy of the entry for me, as it is too soon to have received a copy by mail. I was dismayed to learn that the court will not entertain any of the motions that I have put in on behalf of Exeter Trinity Properties LLC.

This is extremely bad news to me as Exeter Trinity Properties LLC only owns one asset, which is the subject property in the current lawsuit, and with the Notices of Federal Tax Lien against the property it is not possible to obtain a loan in order to obtain funds to hire an attorney.


It seems odd to me that the Supreme Court of the United States would put forth a ruling which leaves an indigent entity without any means to defend itself and its property in a court action. The only funds that the LLC has at its disposal are funds which come in from rental of the property and the budget is quite close in order to meet operating expenses.

In the interest of justice and since the other parties in this case have apparently not been served a copy of the complaint as of this writing, I would ask this court to grant an extension of time for the LLC to attempt to obtain counsel so that the LLC might be properly represented. An extension of 90 days would be appreciated. It will take us some time to attempt to gather funds and to find a lawyer willing to take on our case, and it will take some time for a lawyer to be briefed on the situation so that he can properly address the issues in this case.

The law firms that the LLC has contacted thus far have declined to take a lawsuit against the Internal Revenue Service and the United States. The LLC needs more time to locate an attorney who will be willing to put forth the LLC's claims and defenses.

The situation leading up to this case began over 17 years ago and a 90 day delay should not harm anyone especially since all parties have not yet been served.


